She was the one who pushed for a letter sign out front and often was the one who changed it.

How many of you know our wonderful accompanist, Keith Nash? Keith is a valued member of our congregation, and has been sharing his talents with TKC for 25 years.

Keith had only been in Atlanta for a few months when he met Rabbi Winokur and began playing keyboard for Kehillat Chaim's High Holy Days services, which were held in the Doubletree Hotel at Perimeter that year. The electronic organ, as well as the cantor, were imported from out of town. Keith remained the Kehillah's accompanist as the congregation searched for a permanent location. A few years later, our congregation found its home in Roswell, and two years later, I became part of the clergy team. How lucky for me that Keith was already established with Rabbi Winokur, helping me fit in quickly! During the subsequent years, he has served as accompanist for a myriad of B'nei Mitzvah, and 25 years of High Holy Days, Shabbat and Festival services.

A number of years ago, Keith volunteered to chant Torah on Rosh HaShanah morning. His beautiful cantillation, using the High Holy Days trope (mode), has become an annual tradition for us. It is clear when he chants that he understands the meaning of each word.


On Friday evening, February 11, TKC will present a musically festive service honoring our accompanist, Keith Nash, and his 25 years of service to our congregation. Joining our Adult Choir will be members of the choir from Holy Trinity Parish in Decatur, where Keith serves as music director. Please plan to attend, and to stay for the delicious Oneg Shabbat following the service.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

CHANGE IS IN THE AIR!

For this month's article, I am submitting (a condensed version of) a letter that I sent in mid-December to the TKC Board of Directors. The information is very pertinent for all members of our Kehillah. Please take a moment to read through this so that you are all aware of some important changes that are taking place:

First of all, as always, I want to thank you for your active participation in our Kehillah. Every single one of you makes a huge difference and you are all vital to this organization.

Next, I want to make you aware of some changes that are taking place. Peter Lehrman has resigned his position as VP of Membership. Of course, his involvement and commitment to TKC will continue and his years of service to our temple are much appreciated. In light of this new vacancy, now we are going to shake things up a bit! Hiedi Weiss has graciously accepted taking over the Membership VP, Kathy Starr has graciously accepted taking over Programming VP, and Rhonda Flynn has graciously accepted taking over the Secretary position, which moves her from Trustee to Executive Board member.

Most of you know that I am leaving the country on January 28, returning on March 2. This trip was scheduled before the call came asking me to be President and my acceptance was conditional on being able to still take the trip. Randy Zimler has very graciously accepted assuming the role of "Acting President" during my absence. I am confident that he will be extremely capable in handling anything that may come up during that time and know that you will all give him whatever help or support is required. BTW - for the purpose of full disclosure - I am going to India to visit my son, daughter-in-law and 2 magnificent granddaughters (one of whom I will be meeting for the first time!).

The transition of the office staff is in full swing. We thank Ellen Vann for her 10+ years of service here at the Kehillah. She has been adamant in not wanting any formal "send-off" but I am sure she would appreciate a note or call from you, wishing her well and thanking her for her 10 years of loyal service. Joy Salenfriend has gone from part time to full time. She has assumed all of the administrative duties, has been trained on the primary bookkeeping duties and is officially, the TKC Office Manager. Although it is an overwhelming endeavor, Joy is managing to digest a huge amount of new information and assume new responsibilities while keeping the Temple running without missing a beat. I applaud her tenacity and hope you will offer her a warm welcome and as needs for her help arise, please be patient as everything is still so very new!

Last month, Steve Best was at the office installing and customizing Quick Books and transferring the data from the former software program. We anticipate this will greatly enhance and consolidate the bookkeeping function. While he is at it, maybe Steve can compose a new song for the choir to go with the new accounting system - Oops I digress. :-)

Now that we are through the holidays, December, etc., we need to rev things up! The Finance Committee will begin working on preparing next year's budget and the Programming and Membership VP's will be organizing a calendar meeting with the Office Manager and will set the calendar for 2011/2012. So start thinking of what you may want included in the calendar and/or the Budget. Once Quick Books is up and running, we will be instituting a Purchase Order Policy, so that any and all TKC expenses are identified, approved, and allocated appropriately. Again, stay tuned as details will follow.

As most of you may know, Hiedi and Tim Weiss have gone "above and beyond" by assuming the responsibility of buying the food and setting up the Onegs. This is not only unfair, but is a very inefficient use of their time and energy. I would like us to re-institute Oneg Teams so that every member of TKC has the opportunity to participate in the mitzvah of handling the Onegs on a regularly scheduled basis. This should lessen the burden along with providing an opportunity for fellowship among members.

We are constantly looking for people who you think would be good candidates for board and or committee positions. I only know who I know and I must rely on all of you to be my additional eyes and ears. The staff and clergy have jumpstarted this effort by giving me a short list of potential people, but I would like to encourage you to help me in this as well. Shoot me an email, or give me a call anytime with any suggestions you may have for people who might become more involved and committed to our Kehillah.

Okay, I think I am done. Sorry for the length of this, but we did not have a meeting this month and I felt it was important and timely to communicate all of the above. Your comments and suggestions, are, as always, more than welcome!

What is a Chavurah?

Chavurah (plural is "Chavurot") comes from the Hebrew word, *chaver*, meaning friend, or fellowship. Each Chavurah is a small group of Temple members who come together to learn and socialize. They may study together, worship together, celebrate Jewish holidays together, eat together – any or all of this. For many, the Chavurah becomes an extended family.

What Does a Chavurah accomplish?

The Chavurah celebrates Jewish life. Through programs of study, observances of holidays and festivals, socializing and sharing of simchas, members personalize and vitalize their Jewish experience. They also participate together in Temple life and in community concerns.

When and Where Does a Chavurah Meet?

A Chavurah meets at the discretion of the group. It may meet once a month or three to four times a year, possibly in the homes of the members, in rotation. Each group decides on the most convenient dates and times for themselves.

How Large is a Chavurah?

Each group should have approximately twenty people. However, there are no hard and fast rules about the size. Chavurot exist for families and for individuals.

What is Sisterhood?

Sisterhood/Women of Reform Judaism, is the organization of the women of the congregation who band together in friendship for programs to benefit the Temple and the community, for social activities, for study, and above all, for the growth of the individual so that each may find an opportunity to fulfill her potential as a person. Sisterhood provides the arena for the individual to expand and grow in a Jewish atmosphere and includes all women with an affiliation to the Temple.

Women of Reform Judaism is the women's affiliate of the Union for Reform Judaism, the central body of Reform Judaism in North America. Established in 1913, **WRJ** now represents more than 65,000 women in over 500 women's groups in North America and around the world.

With a mission to ensure the future of Reform Judaism, **WRJ** works to educate and train future sisterhood and congregational leadership about membership, fundraising, leadership skills, advocacy for social justice, and innovative and spiritual programming. Through our YES Fund (Youth, Education, and Special Projects), **WRJ** provides financial support to rabbinic and Cantorial students at Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion, to the youth programs of the Reform Movement, and to programs benefiting women and children in Israel the Former Soviet Union, and around the world.

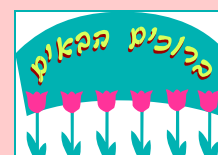

The First Step in Getting Rid of the “R” Word

The R-word – *retarded* – while politically incorrect and demeaning, the word remains commonly used in everyday speech. But finally – finally! – this past fall a step in the right direction was made to remove this word in various areas of government when President Obama signed Rosa’s Law. The law, named for Rosa Marcelino, a Maryland girl with Down syndrome, will replace the terms “mental retardation” and “mentally retarded” with “intellectual disability” and “individual with an intellectual disability” in federal health, education and labor policies.

This is a huge start. To people with Intellectual disabilities, and their families, the R-word is beyond insulting. Slow, delay, hinder, impede and clog are just some of its synonyms. The more correct terminology of intellectual disability describes a *different* ability that individuals have, and the focus should be on the individual’s actual ability and strengths.

As many as three out of every 100 people have an intellectual disability - almost twice the number of Jews. And when you think of that three percent of the population, be sure to add in their families, friends and others who care about them. So, next time you think of using the R-word, think of how many people you’re offending – because it’s a LOT.

Remove the R-word from your vocabulary. Replace it with “intellectual” and “disability”. These words are not demeaning and, when you use them properly, you’ll sound perceptive and appropriate.

Always remember, individuals with intellectual disabilities are members of our community. They may be your neighbor or you may see them at synagogue or the grocery store. They may be your employee or your child’s camp friend. And they deserve the same respect as anyone else.

And one more thing: Even if you don’t use the R-word, you may know someone who does. Please take the initiative and correct them. If they are referring to someone with an intellectual disability, let them know what’s appropriate. If they are using the word inappropriately, ask them to use another word. You’ll have more respect for yourself and for your friend.

*February is Jewish Disability Awareness Month (JDAM). The purpose of this month is to promote awareness and inclusion of individuals with different abilities in aspects of life. In honor of JDAM, the Coordinated Network – comprised of Jewish Family & Career Services, Amit and the Marcus Jewish Community Center of Atlanta – has compiled a list of events, including a program for Atlanta teens on February 6th at the MJCCA – a screening of *Darius Goes West*. Person Centered Planning (PCP) is a set of processes, tools and approaches designed to assist someone to plan their life and support. It is used most often as a life planning model to enable individuals with disabilities or otherwise requiring support to increase their personal self-determination and improve their own independence. PCP is accepted as good practice in many countries throughout the world. It is most often used for life planning with people with learning and developmental disabilities, though recently it has been advocated as a method of planning personalized support with many other sections of society who find themselves disempowered by traditional methods of service delivery, including children, people with physical disabilities, people with mental health issues and older people.

Stacey Ramirez is the Director of Individual and Family Supports for the Center for Leadership in Disability at Georgia State University in Atlanta. In this role she develops and delivers training programs on person-centered planning, autism, and advocacy. Stacey has worked as a parent mentor in Cobb County and for the Georgia Office of Developmental Disabilities. She is the proud mother of three boys, one of whom has autism.
